Bandak Lul's family fled South Sudan when he was a child, and he grew up for 14 years in a refugee camp in Ethiopia. After being granted refugee status in 2006, he attended high school in Arizona and then graduated from ASU. He is now at the ASU Office of Sex Trafficking Intervention Research (STIR), where he advocates for refugees and against human trafficking. Bandak Lul has risen from adverse circumstances to earn a master's degree from ASU in social justice and human rights, as well as two ASU bachelor's degrees, in sociology and political science. Lul has been appointed as a youth delegate for the United Nations Human Rights International, representing South Sudan. He served as a member of the planning committee and speaker's bureau at the Migrant and Refugee Leadership Academy and also serves on the advisory board at Refugee Code Academy. Lul has appeared on CNN denouncing the administration's derogatory comments toward immigrants. He has also spoken at Uncharted-The Berkeley Festival of Ideas, as a panel member at Amnesty International USA Regional Conference, and at an ASU refugee and migrant panel discussion.
