

### **Biographies**

Kennedy Bekedam, a dedicated choreographer and dancer based in southern Arizona, is currently pursuing a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Dance Performance at Arizona State University's Herberger Institute for Design and the Arts, with an anticipated graduation in May 2024. Kennedy has been actively involved in numerous university dance performances, including Transitions (senior capstone projects) and productions like *Defendit Numerous* by Takela King and *Church* by Mia Calichio. Her commitment to the art form is evident in her membership with KeyFrame collective, a group of six talented individuals focused on creating compelling dance films. Together, they secured the Best Student Film award at the Arizona Drive-In Dance Film Festival. Kennedy's artistic exploration focuses on feminine movements, inspired by runway shows and fashion events, challenging audience perspectives. With aspirations to become a choreographer, she aims to infuse her fusion-style movement into collaborations with designer companies globally, spreading her creative vision beyond dance into the world of fashion.

Eliana Bracamonte is a performer and choreographer based out of Arizona. She received an academic scholarship to study at Arizona State University in the Herberger Institute of Design and the Arts. Eliana is pursuing her Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in Dance Performance and will be graduating in May of 2024. She performed in the 2023 Super Bowl LVII halftime show as a field dancer and has participated in ASU dance program's Undergraduate Project Presentations and Transitions. She has found a strong interest in integrating dance and video production into her work. Eliana frequently utilizes video editing software to create multimedia work that combines movement, music, and cinematography. She plans on furthering this craft to create a collaborative approach to her artistic endeavors.

Diana Ion is a Romanian American performing artist based in Phoenix, Arizona. She is completing a BA degree in Performance and Movement at Arizona State University. She started her dance training at Marilyn's Academy of Dance at the age of 12 and has gone on to teach dance/ yoga classes for the past 4 years at ASU SDFC West and Tempe campuses. She has garnered recognition on both campuses for her advocacy in promoting inclusivity and fostering spaces where people feel welcome. Not limited to dance as her sole means of artistic expression, she possesses a passion for singing. She has competed in multiple singing competitions, performed at a Christmas charity event for foster children, and gained diverse experiences providing creative direction on music video sets for local artists. She is a storyteller and aims to create artworks and businesses that uplift and entertain the collective consciousness and reach global audiences.

**Kyla Kabat** is a choreographer, performer and company director based in Phoenix, Arizona. She is pursuing a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Dance from Barrett, the Honors College at Arizona State University along with a minor in business. While at Arizona State, Kyla has performed in multiple dance productions such as SpringDanceFest, Transitions, and numerous Undergraduate Project Presentations, in which her self-choreographed works were also presented. In 2021 Kyla premiered her work, "Toxic Love", which had been chosen by Arizona State University to represent the school's dance program in a regional dance conference, *ACDA*. The following year her work, "On The Edge", was showcased in Arizona's contemporary dance festival, *Breaking Ground* in January of 2023. Kyla is in the process of putting together her honors thesis, capstone project and other choreographic works to be featured this spring. Outside of school, she is the director of *Elite Dance Pro*, a dance company in Gilbert, Arizona, where she mentors aspiring artists who want to take their training to the next level.

Maili Monenerkit of the Navajo Nation of Arizona and Comanche Nation of Oklahoma is from Phoenix, Arizona. Maili began her dance journey at Metropolitan Arts Institute in 2015 mentored by Nicole L. Olson. Upon graduation from high school, she continued her education at Scottsdale Community College and received her Associate Degree in Fine Arts with an Emphasis in Dance, Associate Degree in Applied Sciences, and a certificate in Dance Technology and Performance. In Fall 2022, Maili transferred to Arizona State University's Herberger Institute for Design and the Arts to pursue her Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in Dance. Maili recently completed an internship at the Smithsonian's

National Museum of the American Indian in Washington D.C. under museum advancement in the Special Events department. She hopes to develop more experience within the museum field while also arranging and executing extensive projects within the dance community.

Alyssa Ramirez, a devoted artist from Phoenix, Arizona, focusing on Hip Hop and street styles, is pursuing a BFA in Dance Education at Arizona State University. Engaging in diverse ASU productions, including Graduate Applied Projects, she is actively participating in Michele Byrd McPhee's House Residency. Alyssa is dedicated to cultivating her artistry in Hip Hop freestyle and battling, concurrently working towards her Krump rank as Girl Skillz in the Skillz Fam.

Kendall Sharpe, a passionate dancer with a lifelong commitment to movement, has received training in various styles, including ballet, contemporary, and jazz. She infuses each performance with a blend of emotion and technical precision. Having attended Scottsdale Community College, Kendall later transferred to Arizona State University's Herberger Institute for Design and the Arts to pursue her Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in Dance starting in the Fall of 2022. Embracing diverse influences, from classical to avant-garde, Kendall has shaped a unique dance language. Her dedication to continuous growth involves exploring new forms and pushing artistic boundaries. Onstage, Kendall captivates audiences through expressive movements that transcend words, sparking joy and connection.

Alexis Solano is a fourth-year dance student at Arizona State University pursuing a BFA in Dance Performance. With a burning passion for pushing boundaries and redefining dance as an art form, Alex is an honored and nominated recipient of the ASU Gammage scholarship award for the 2023-2024 school year. Alex is recognized for consecutive selections for ASU's Undergraduate Project Presentations throughout her four years, and entrusted as one of the artistic directors for the most recent Fall 2023 production. Passionate about merging multimedia and performance art, Alex is consistently challenging dance's boundaries to convey impactful, universally resonant messages.

Aidan Strelnik, a choreographer, director and color guard tech based in Arizona, has been actively involved in the Desert Vista Marching Band and was a member of Fenix Independent, a world-class, independent color guard. During his tenure with Fenix, he contributed to the show "A Breath of Fresh Air," which achieved a notable 12th place at world finals. Currently, Aidan is channeling his creative energies into crafting a fashion-forward dance piece for his senior year project at Arizona State University. The aim is to bring a fresh perspective to both doll enthusiasts and those who are still embracing their inner child. Set to graduate in May 2024, Aidan looks forward to making a unique mark on the dance community.
