Laila Al-Arian is an Emmy-winning journalist and executive producer of "Fault Lines," a current affairs program on Al Jazeera English. She has produced documentaries on topics including the U.S. heroin epidemic, the Trump travel ban and factory conditions in Bangladesh.

Her work has earned a Peabody Award, a Robert F. Kennedy Award, and multiple Emmy nominations. Al-Arian's reporting has been featured in "The Nation" and "The New York Times." She is coauthor of "Collateral Damage: America's War Against Iraqi Civilians."

The Hardt-Nickachos Lectures in Peace Studies features leading scholars and practitioners whose work highlights humanity's imagination of peace and efforts to construct peace in diverse locations, historical periods, and in the contemporary moment.

Israel's bombardment and siege of Gaza have set grim records, from the percentage of children killed to high casualties among journalists, doctors and aid workers. Yet, Western mainstream media have failed to convey the scale of the horror, often minimizing it or manufacturing consent for genocide. This talk examines how media coverage has relied on racist tropes, dehumanized Palestinians and abandoned basic journalism rules. It also highlights Gaza's unprecedented devastation and the heroic work of Palestinian journalists documenting Israel's attacks, risking their lives to serve as the world's eyes and ears.
