



Global Advocacy Certificate Program

The Global Advocacy certificate program is for ASU faculty and staff who wish to cultivate a globally-minded campus for international students and scholars. By attending a series of workshops, participants will broaden their awareness of cross-cultural topics and learn specific strategies for supporting international students and scholars in the classroom and workplace.

BECOME A GLOBAL ADVOCATE

To earn a Global Advocacy certificate, participants must register for and attend the **Foundations of Global Advocacy** core course plus at least three elective courses during an academic year. All courses are free of charge* and fill on a first-come, first-served basis.

Participants in Global Advocacy Workshops will learn:

- skills to assess cultural intelligence and how cultural lenses influence people's interactions
- strategies for interacting and communicating with international students and colleagues
- techniques for assisting international students for academic and cultural success
- awareness of international campus resources for students, staff, and faculty
- F-1 and J-1 immigration regulations followed by international students and scholars
