

Whiteness, Yancy argues, is a site of fragility that has a binary structure. In other words, the logic of whiteness needs the other, the Black, the wretched, the damned. As such, Black people will function as a site of pain and suffering, the sub-persons, the ontologically needed and yet discarded and disposable. At the end of the day, we need to envision what it would look like for whites to live in a state of rage against white power and white privilege and begin to create conditions for this rage.

**Speaking the Unspeakable** (Feb. 17-18, 2017) examines how race and racial inequality are structured, experienced, and felt through the languages of **colorblindness**, **racism**, and **antiracism**. This two-day conference brings together scholars, community experts, students, and public-service providers for interactive workshops, panels, roundtables, and more.
