

# Lessons From the Politics of Hate

## How does political hate spread, and what does it mean for the future of American democracy?

Drawing on her landmark book, Angelia Wilson examines how organizations on the Christian Right have strategically constructed a theological justification for political hate — and what that means for democracy today. Through original data collection and financial analysis, Wilson traces how "war talk" has normalized an ethic of hate, transforming faith communities into mobilized political armies. This lecture reflects on what these lessons mean for the future of religion and civic life in America.

**Angelia Wilson**

Angelia R. Wilson is Professor of Politics at the University of Manchester. She is the author of several books, including *Why Europe Is Lesbian and Gay Friendly (and Why America Never Will Be)*, *Below the Belt: Sexuality, Religion and the American South*, and editor of *Situating Intersectionality: Politics, Policy, and Power*.

Her most recent work, *The Politics of Hate: How the Christian Right Darkened America's Political Soul*, draws on extensive original research — including analysis of more than 20,000 emails from nine Religious Right organizations — to examine how the Christian Right has reshaped American political life over the past half century.
